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Productive Living Board (PLB) empowers people throughout their lifetime by investing property tax dollars in a spectrum of carefully selected services that make a difference in people's lives.

Who is PLB?

PLB was created by taxpayers in 1979 when St. Louis County voters passed a tax levy to fund services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). PLB distributes those tax dollars to local partner agencies that provide services for people with IDD who live in St. Louis County. PLB strives to understand and meet local community needs.

Who is eligible for PLB-funded services?

Anyone wishing to access services must have a qualifying developmental disability. This includes people with a diagnosis of Intellectual disability, cerebral palsy, autism, epilepsy, or learning disabilities related to brain dysfunction that:

- Results in substantial functional limitations in two or more of the following areas of major life activities:
 - Self-care
 - Receptive and expressive language development
 - Learning
 - Self-direction
 - Capacity for independent living or economic self-sufficiency
 - Mobility
- Manifested before the age of 22
- Is likely to continue for a lifetime

To access PLB-funded services, people with IDD do not need to receive Targeted Case Management (Service Coordination) through the Missouri Department of Mental Health's Division of Developmental Disabilities Regional Office or the Center for Human Services.

How do people access PLB-funded services?

People contact the agencies of their choosing to access the services they are interested in.

If the person has a Medicaid Waiver through the Missouri Department of Mental Health's Division of Developmental Disabilities, contact their Service Coordinator (also known as a Case Manager, or Support Coordinator) to discuss whether the service is available through the Medicaid Waiver.

Community Living

services help people learn skills so they can live where they choose and be a part of their community.

Pre-Independent Supported Living Assistance (Pre-ISLA)

supports people 18 years of age and older who currently live with their family and want to prepare to move into their own home. People learn the skills needed to live on their own and participate in the community as they choose. Services are time-limited and are provided in the home and community.

- Adventure programs for people aged 18 years or older
- Summer socialization for school-aged children
- After-school extended day or school break care, while parents are working, for people 10-21 years of age

support people in getting to/from their sheltered employer through safe and reliable transportation.

To apply for employment transportation, people must communicate their needs with a Support/Service Coordinator, should they have one assigned or their sheltered workshop employer.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I access PLB-funded services?

Contact the agency you are interested in to begin the enrollment process. It is recommended that if more than one agency provides the same service, you interview them to determine who you feel would best meet your needs.

A few sample questions you may choose to ask:

- How long have you been providing this service?
- What is different about how you provide this service compared to other local providers I may be talking to?
- What is the process for applying for services?
- Do you currently have a waitlist?

How much do PLB services cost?

PLB funds agencies so that all or most costs are covered for participants. Talk with the agency to determine if there is a cost associated with the service.

How long do I have to wait for services to start?

Waiting time varies as each funded agency has its own enrollment process. Should there be a waiting list, each agency maintains its own list.

Will PLB pay for my sheltered employment transportation?

To get PLB-funded transportation to and/or from your sheltered employer, talk with your Service/Support Coordinator or your sheltered workshop employer.

Do I have to have a Service/Support Coordinator to get PLB-funded services?

No, you do not need a Service/Support Coordinator to get PLB-funded services. You must have a diagnosed developmental disability as defined on [page 2](#).

If I have a Medicaid Waiver, can I access PLB-funded services?

PLB funding is typically for people who don't have other funding sources, so you will want to contact your Service Coordinator (also may be known as the Case Manager or Support Coordinator) to inquire about whether the service you are seeking is available through your Medicaid Waiver.

Sample Interview Questions

for a potential provider. Please note that these are sample questions and you are not required to use them.

1. How long have you been providing this service? What other types of services do you provide?
2. What is different about how you provide this service compared to other local providers that I may be talking with?
3. What is the process for applying for services?
4. Do you currently have a waitlist?
5. Does your agency complete background checks for your staff? How often are they repeated?
6. How does your agency train staff:
 - To support people with behavior support needs?
 - To support people with personal care needs?
 - In CPR and First Aid?
 - To pass medication?
7. Does your agency help with transportation for people who use your services?
8. How does your staff learn how to support each person? Do you use a plan to outline personal preferences and needs?
9. How often does your agency review the supports needed by the people you support? Who is included in the review?
10. How does your agency communicate with people who use your services?
 - What is an acceptable response time if I have questions for staff?
11. What happens if staff quit or are unavailable? Do you have a backup plan in place to continue supporting people?
