To the Citizens of St. Louis County,

The last two and a half years have been a time of significant transition, perhaps even transformation, for the PLB. The Board adopted a new Strategic Plan several years ago that prioritized making sure that PLB is a trusted partner in supporting the needs of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) in St. Louis County. We embraced this charge and have dramatically changed how we listen, learn, lead, and communicate.

What started as a three year strategic goal to reflect and adapt has now been infused into PLB's culture. We believe we have a responsibility to leverage our resources, including public tax dollars, to influence success. 2018 ACHIEVEMENTS

We are especially pleased to share the following achievements in Fiscal Year 2018:

Increasing capacity for self-advocacy and service system navigation for individuals with IDD and their families

- Launched IDDHelp.org, which offers a free call center and website for people looking for information and navigation assistance within the field of developmental disabilities. This is a partnership with the Developmental Disability Resource Board of St. Charles County, the St. Louis City Office of Developmental Disability Resources, and United Way of Greater St. Louis, leveraging their national 211 platform. www.IDDHelp.org
- Expanding F.A.C.T. Parent Support Partner program into St. Louis County. Professional peer mentors who have a child with a disability provide emotional support, resources, navigation and advocacy training. www.factmo.org

Continuing evaluation of current and future needs and the service system's capacity to meet them

- 4,524 individuals received one or more surveys in the mail for the 7,089
 PLB funded services they receive. 36% responded and 95% reported they are satisfied with their services. 198 reported additional needs.
- Expanded Partnership for Hope, a partnership with the Department of Mental Health, St. Louis Regional Office, that provides critical services that help families support their family member at home.

Ensuring compliance measures are balanced with facilitating greatest impact

- Received a clean audit opinion for FY 2018.
- Initiated a project to redesign current Quality Enhancement and Service Excellence processes in collaboration with three local Senate Bill 40 Boards. Implementation is expected in 2020.

Communicating the important work of PLB and our many partners in the community and ensuring awareness of resources

- Completed Communications Strategy to serve as a guide in providing credible, compelling, and consistent information.
- Completed Marketing Plan to achieve the goals within the Communications Strategy and to serve as a blueprint for reaching key audiences, such as people with IDD.


